New Permits:

You must be a paid-up club member for 6 months or more before you can apply for a new permit and you must include \$20 in cash or cheque, payable to the MMCCV.

When applying for a Permit for a...

<u>Morris Minor</u>. Please Send a <u>Current RWC</u>, with Proof of ownership, VicRoads Club Permit application, Vehicle eligibility and standard declaration for club permit vehicle.

Non-Morris Minor. The request must be accompanied by all of the above plus proof of current registration of a Morris Minor, held in the name of the applicant.

In addition to the above, 6 recent photos 1: Front, 2: Rear, 3: Driver's side, 4: Driving position (side-on with driver's door open), 5: Chassis number or ID plate, 6: Engine Bay.

You must clearly sign and date the rear side of each of the 6 photos.

Renewals:

Do not forget to sign your renewal application. If not signed it will be returned to you and so waste valuable time and postage.

Please send a stamped self-addressed envelope plus VicRoads Forms. No Photos needed.

Remember it is your responsibility to renew on time. There will be no reminders

Rules regarding club CPS responsibilities

A vehicle is not eligible for a Club Permit if any of the following conditions exist...


- The member has ceased to be financial.

AN EXTREMELY SHORT HISTORY OF THE MORRIS MINOR



Amazingly, the **Morris Minor** was made for 24 years, from 1948 to 1972, and by the end, 1.3 million had been sold. During that time it went from an avante-garde family saloon to a quaint icon of Britishness.

Despite three different phases of production, it never lost its characteristic shape or its small-car economy.

Designed by Alec Issigonis, it was originally going to be a more radical design with, amongst other innovations, a flat-four engine to lower the centre of gravity and move the engine as far forward as possible.

This didn't make it into the production version, but it was all part of the design ethos, which was to make a small, economical family car with the best possible roadholding and maximum possible interior space.

It used 14-inch wheels – smaller than average for the time – to reduce cabin intrusion, and these were placed as close as possible to the corners of the car. The reduced unsprung weight of the smaller wheels also improved the handling.

The car's designers had to accept many compromises before the car eventually went into production, but that didn't stop Issigonis making a late change when he saw the prototype, which had the typically narrow body of cars of that time.

He had the prototype sawn in half lengthways, then the two halves moved apart until it 'looked right'. The width of the production car was increased by four inches, which improved the interior space but required a number of late design changes in the panels and trim – the front bumpers on early cars had to have a four-inch-wide painted strip added to the centre.

LAST MORRIS MINOR BUILT RETURNS TO COWLEY AFTER 50 YEARS

A historically significant Morris Minor has returned to the place where it rolled off the production line on the 12 November 1970. 50 years after it was built, the last Morris Minor saloon to be produced has been relocated into the building where it was made at MINI Plant Oxford in Cowley, Oxfordshire and now forms part of the factory's collection of historic vehicles.

The gleaming car is a credit to the professionals, specialists and volunteers from the Morris Minor Owners club who have worked tirelessly over the past four years to restore the car to its former glory. Today, the fully restored vehicle looks just as good as it did when it was first built. The transformation seemed impossible when the car was discovered in 2016 after languishing in the open for many years. The provenance of the vehicle was well established having previously been offered for sale in 1994.

Sadly, the new owner at that time was unable to enjoy the pleasure of ownership due to ill health. After his demise, the car was abandoned, and it deteriorated badly in the intervening years. The car was acquired by the Morris Minor Owners Club in 2016. Initially a phased restoration was planned. Substantial structural repairs were needed, and the services of a specialist welder and fabricator were enlisted. In 2018, thanks to a generous bequest from a former member, things gathered pace and with the help of members with specialist skills, original components including the engine and gearbox were rebuilt. The bulk of the refurbishment and the reassembly of the car was undertaken by volunteer club members in Derby where the MMOC has its headquarters.

Club Secretary, Ray Newell who accompanied the car on its return to 'T Building' (which houses MINI Plant Oxford's historic car collection) at a specially arranged socially distanced handover prior to the current lockdown said: "The car is a credit to those who have supported the club in getting it back on the road in time for this significant anniversary. "We are grateful to staff at MINI Plant Oxford for their assistance in getting the car to into the factory's museum and for housing and looking after it for the

foreseeable future. We hope that post lock down that people will be able to come to view the vehicle and appreciate what is a wonderful example of this iconic, British car."

Steve Wrelton, spokesman for MINI Plant Oxford, said: "The backstory and subsequent restoration of this car to its former glory is nothing short of staggering. Like the Mini that came after it, the Morris Minor was one of the most popular and recognisable cars in Britain. To have the last one built returning to its spiritual home and joining our car collection here at Plant Oxford is just fantastic.



BOB & LORRAINE TERRY - MORRIS MINOR ENTHUSIASTS

Mount Waverley resident, Bob Terry, has been restoring Morris Minors for many years and in the following article, he tells us about how he got started and he and his wife, Lorraine's, involvement with Morris Minors over the years.

Our house was built for us in Mt Waverley in 1962 and it has been great living in the area and bringing up our family, a son and two daughters which were a joyful team. My job as a country company representative took me away to some extent.

Scouting in Waverley for fifteen years, with other enthusiastic dads was great. Training in leadership was very much involved and eventually receiving an overseas recognition for training.

Having been involved in engineering, I was offered the opportunity of setting up a Service Division for a South Australian company in Burwood in 1963. 1 really did appreciate those years; giving me insight to so many fields of industry and manufacture, from the fishing industry to sugarcane harvesting.

After 25 years a change was in the offing with the Defence Department. With my varied experience in engineering it was a new challenge cataloguing and involvement in training for some time.

My hobbies in the latter years were very much involved in Morris Minors of the post war type, because of their simplicity and reliability. This attracted me to fully restore six lowlight series over the years. Although early training as a motor engineer was all very well, further training in panel beating and spray painting took me back to school part time, which was well worthwhile. My dear wife being a dressmaker was truly excellent with the interior restoration requirements.

For six and a half years we had a successful Wedding Car business, "Morris Minor Wedding Cars". These were four registered hire cars fully restored. After thirty Morris Minors that's it. We are proud owners of two lowlight vehicles, a 1948 sedan "restored", one of the oldest in Australia and 1950 convertible "restored" in recent times. They have both won several trophies for restoration.

We belong to two car clubs - the Morris Register, catering for vehicles built by William Morris up to Feb.1952 and the Morris Minor Car Club of Vic. It is our responsibility within Australia at the moment to collect the details of all the early Morris Minors from 1948 to 1952, for the Morris Owners Club in the U.K. Should any person require details in respect of these clubs 1 will assist in supplying a contact number.

Restoring MG's with a close neighbour is my current challenge. I am a firm believer that while we are endeavouring to maintain our health as time goes by, an enjoyable challenge, whatever it might be is really worthwhile.


