New Permits:

You must be a paid-up club member for 6 months or more before you can apply for a new permit and you must include \$20 in cash or cheque, payable to the MMCCV.

When applying for a Permit for a...

<u>Morris Minor</u>. Please Send a <u>Current RWC</u>, with Proof of ownership, VicRoads Club Permit application, Vehicle eligibility and standard declaration for club permit vehicle.

Non-Morris Minor. The request must be accompanied by all of the above plus proof of current registration of a Morris Minor, held in the name of the applicant.

In addition to the above, 6 recent photos 1: Front, 2: Rear, 3: Driver's side, 4: Driving position (side-on with driver's door open), 5: Chassis number or ID plate, 6: Engine Bay.

You must clearly sign and date the rear side of each of the 6 photos.

Renewals:

Do not forget to sign your renewal application.

If not signed it will be returned to you and so waste valuable time and postage.

Please send a stamped self-addressed envelope plus VicRoads Forms. No Photos needed.

Remember it is your responsibility to renew on time. There will be no reminders

Rules regarding club CPS responsibilities

A vehicle is not eligible for a Club Permit if any of the following conditions exist...

- The member has ceased to be financial.
- The vehicle is being used for commercial gain.
- The vehicle is unroadworthy.
- The vehicle is sold with logbook and plates.
- The vehicle is sold to a friend so that a new logbook might be obtained.


President's Report - March 2021

MYANMAR & THE MORRIE – A LOVE STORY by Tony Hamilton

He pointed out the warlords had in fact been very good for this part of Karin State. See, he pointed sideways, how this horribly maintained bumpy twisty excuse for a road, had just given way to a newly sealed wider arterial? Crossing the Dawna Range used to take 3 hours...and now just about 45 minutes! Funded by the local warlords! Yes, my double chins nodded enthusiastically – a great improvement.

But at that time good roads still didn't fix the mystery of Myanmar's biggest traffic dilemma. "Why?" I asked Joseph meekly, as we slowed behind yet another crawling truck. "Why do you have RIGHT HAND drive cars, AND drive on the RIGHT HAND side of the road?

"It's craaaaaazzzzzzyyyyy" I muttered, as we veered sharply out to the left verge for the 30th time, only to be staring at a rapidly looming semi-trailer grille. The only way Joseph could check if we could pass! He efficiently swerved rightward in behind the lorry and avoided yet another head-on. I should have sat on the other side of the car I thought. Or perhaps I should just close my eyes and pretend to be asleep. Home seems so far away.

"Yes!", Joesph said "I think the government is changing what side we drive on in a few months. But it will be an extremely dangerous, confused time." "No kiddin" I concurred. We crawled on behind the noisy belching hauler, as it protested every inch of this 1 in 6 gradient, and sweeping curves cut through rainforest. Hooray for the warlords alright – if this is progress thank god we aint on the old road.

As we ascended I checked my phone. 1 bar of signal cautiously flickered into view. PING! Samsung announced its renewed handshake with the universe. AHHHH. A text from Katie. "I've found a Morrie I like." "Am texting the owner for details". "good on u" I clumsily thumbed back... "go frit". Katie had been firming in her dream...a convertible is the go, later model if possible, good condition, pay a little more. "Sure" I had said as we chatted about it on the way to the airport. "Sounds great", but quietly curious how far this would actually go. She looks serious. Interesting hobby, but I just can't see her, well, you know, doing it. Will it sit here rusting away? Such thoughts drifted away in the dust behind Joseph's car, along with phone signal.

In preparation for the trip I had studied a little on Karen (Kayen) state's History. British Rule had created some serious native conversion to Christianity, which led to many Karenese enjoying elevated positions within Burmese Society. Christians actively assisted the British in repressing unrest and rebellions during Anglo-Burmese wars. Karens became the earliest Burmese to organize into political groups, one of which would become the Karen National Union (KNU) – regarded as the longest running resistance today. Pre and post WW2, increasingly nationalist

Bhuddist Burmese were at odds with pro-British Karen people and the KNU. Burma's long history of wars has resulted in a Bhuddist flavour unafraid of conflict. Meanwhile, in WW2 Karens were a formidable resistance to the Japanese and essential to the Brits. In exchange for this alliance, they were reportedly offered independence post war. Illustrated by the current Rohingyan crisis, there are various ethnic minorities in Myanmar. A unified self-governed country was always going to be a difficult task. Fearing reprisals at the end of British occupation, the now communist KNU pushed hard for the promised independence from Burma. Failed negotiations, politically inspired stoushes, and minor conflicts led to the KNU declaring war on its own country in 1949. Consequently, this state in some ways became left behind for decades. A poor cousin to those states enjoying military favouritism.

The majority of Karens don't actually reside in areas under KNU rule, and didn't support conflict, even though KNU were effectively the state "government" from the 1940's until early 2,000's. Like the rest of Myanmar, they are not a homogenous people, with around 20% Christian and the vast majority (70%+) Bhuddist. A shocking consequence has been displacement of near 200,000 Karens, into the Mae Sot region of Thailand. A bizarre statistic that more Karens live outside of the state than in it.

Today the state enjoys a more benign government interested in progress of its peoples, like much of the rest of Myanmar. KNU is confined to the mountains and is evolving sometimes into a beneficial outfit.

four warlord boom-gates later, I had adjusted to the searching looks, guns, and smiles in this eastern region of Karin state. But my trepidation hadn't entirely eased. No doubt exacerbated by my back and neck feeling every bump in the road, duly amplified by the recalcitrant suspension, brakes and steering of the family "limo". Surely a Morrie would deliver a more supple ride? Surely! Rounding a bend onto the mighty Thanlyin river, Joseph proudly described how the KNU kidnapped a state politician at the official opening of the new road, when that individual unwisely attempted to claim some credit for its construction. He was released after apologising and committing funds as reimbursement. Around 400 metres wide, the Thanlyin is clean, deep, and flowing proud in the knowledge of its own power. 3 or 4 conduits wind their way through dark mangrove expanses. We spanned it in stages across an impressive steel bridge. Not far downriver a peasant was expertly guiding a punt across its graceful expanse. Intent on safe carriage of his cargo: a Ferrari and military figure leaning on his beloved car, savouring the moment whilst enjoying a leisurely smoke. Fixated on yet another contradiction of this country, I almost missed the mobile phone tower soaring above the adjoining forest.

Flights Of Fancy

Acceptance of Minutes

Minutes of the previous meeting held 14th January 2021 accepted on the motion of Jim Gourlay and seconded by Robert Thorpe.

President's Report: As per the Generator.

Secretary's Report: Various magazines, flyers and emails received. Advised of notice received for the Swanpool Motor Festival and also a notice received from the AOMC about Morris parts and associated tools that had been stolen. They ask that our members be on the lookout for anyone trying to sell the parts or tools and if so to report it to the Police.

Acting Club Captain's Report: Mike advised we had approximately 32 people on the Sugarloaf run and about 38 people to the Australia Day event. Both were very successful events. Next run will be the Teddy Bear's Picnic in Canterbury on 21st February followed by the run for the Ballarat Club's 40th Anniversary event on 21st March. Members wanting to go on the run to Ballarat need to register their interest by 5th March. We need someone to organise a run in April. MY 35 YEARS AROUND MORRIS MINORS

My 35 years around Morris Minor Cars

I can hear it ringing in my ear now. "Get a two door Thousand" he said in his broad Lancashire accent.

That was some time in 1984 when I saw Morris Minor Club member Jim Ackers at the Pleasant Corner Shell Service Station. He was wearing a windcheater with the Morris Minor Club logo on the front, and I commented that I'd always wanted one of those cars – actually I said that about most cars, and that's how I came by the Jaguar S type. I knew Jim as we had worked at the same place some years before. I think it was really an Austin A30 I wanted, as a teenager my cousin had a 2 door A35 – an import with the 948cc engine and a roaring exhaust under the passenger door.



Anyway, the next Saturday, there was an ad in the Courier for a Morris Minor, so I phoned the number. I had no knowledge of the marque but agreed to go to Hepburn Springs to inspect the car. I was more interested in the Mark 2 Jaguar in his carport, but as I already had an S Type at home and the Morry had the right number of doors, I agreed to collect it the next day on the way back from Melbourne.

It was metallic lime green in colour and although a bit untidy, it had an excellent engine and plenty of rego. Jim came around, and said it was a 1957 1000 model, and if I wanted to sell it, he would give me what I paid for it. He also gave me a membership application form to BMMC.

Not much later, a woman who worked in my fruit shop said she wanted a "Morris". I had spotted a grey 4 door Morris Minor 1000 in Barry Smith's trade-in yard in Creswick Rd and collected it to show the lady. "No, not that type", she remarked, "a Morris". I was a bit confused, but well I like the wide wheels, and it went better than the green one, so I decided to keep it. Sometime later she turned up in a "Morris 1100"!!

Jim took over the two-door, named it "Kermit", ripped out that excellent Morris 948cc engine, implanted a Corolla motor and changed the colour to a no-name pale blue.

I've never been one to name my cars, so this one became the Morry, or the grey car, or HJM, but as more came along they were known by the colour.

I used the Morry to go to work at Mt Rowan which was only 6 km but a long way in Ballarat, I drove it hard (so what's new, you say?), and one morning I heard a rattly noise from the engine – and the oil gauge read zero!! The oil gauge venturi tube had dislodged and spat the oil out. That put back, a fill up of oil, it appeared OK.

As we were preparing for the Morris Minor Touring Club trip to Birdsville, I thought I needed a back-up motor, so I bought a car from a Morris Minor Club member in Geelong. It was very rusty but had new tyres and a good motor. The rego, GRO 825, had just expired so I paid that, bogged up the rust, and a friend got a RWC. We used it as a spare car for a while until daughter Kate turned 18, and then she drove it to University for four years until she had some money and bought a Subaru. It towed a trailer at the Swap a few times and was often borrowed. That became the "blue car". My other daughter used it in a Morris Minor Club Rally and drove it around with a broken spring. I eventually sold the car with a bit of rego.

I had been offered local member Eddie Sarah's red MM tourer after he died and collected it early on a Saturday morning. With lack of space and being an awkward time personally, I kept the acquisition to myself so put it in a friend's shed where it stayed for 5 months.

I also got a trailer load of bits (as you do) including a red front mudguard – and brought the trailer home.

I had often said to my 13 year old son that one day we would get a red convertible. On seeing the mudguard, he commented, "Now all we need is the rest of the car to go with it!" – little did he know

Five months later, I had moved it to Mrs. Next-door's garage, and my son sprung me working on it . . . "It's a lovely car", he said (an expression we used), knowing without any words exchanged that it was ours. He got a lot of pleasure from that car during those years. (I was on my own with the three children by this time)

A progression of "parts cars" followed, including a couple for Simon, one of which we started to restore, and it took up space in my garage for nearly 20 years unfinished. Simon had wanted a Mini after I once pointed to a Mini and said that they had similar mechanicals to a Minor - I thought I'd converted him. As he had turned 18, and he couldn't travel on the bus to University anymore, he bought a Mini K from KJH and lost interest in the Minors.

Well, he was a petrol head too, and after joining the Light Car Club, he rally-crossed the Mini claiming third spot in his first year's aggregate. As the Mini wouldn't keep up with the WRX Subaru's, it got the 1275cc treatment. He claims he ran the same engine in three subsequent cars – it has had two blocks and 3 heads. The Mini became a second car when the bassinet wouldn't fit, and he bought a Subaru.

My second daughter was at Melbourne Uni, and we considered the regular trips too far for a Morry. We decided to go modern and bought her a Subaru. I couldn't be left out and not having a modern, so when the kids left home, there was another Subaru in the drive. (Between the 3 kids and I, we had a progression of Subaru's - my current Outback is number 16 – and Kate has just replaced her 4th Subaru Outback making the new one number 17)

I have really enjoyed this car. It has been on many Morris Minor Tours including Birdsville and down the Birdsville Track with Simon driving, then 13, the Iron Knob/Flinders Ranges run, the Gulf of Carpentaria and Reef journey (Kurumba & Cairns with Max) and the Ayers Rock/Kings Canyon and Alice Springs/Innamincka with Geoff as codriver.

A few years later, around 1994, my friend and mechanical guru, Ian Robbie found a 1275cc short motor (ex Morris 1100S) at the Supa Swap, and convinced me to buy it, my arm still hurts from the twisting. He converted it from east/west configuration to north/south to fit the Minor. We also fitted Morris Marina disc brakes and rear end and to keep the Morris look (and gearing) I had the hubs re-drilled to take the 14" Morris wheels and hubcaps. Much development has taken place since, and the car is very usable.

As the children left home I didn't need a big house with its two car garage (and generous friends who lent me space) so I sought out a better sized garage where I could put a hoist – rare in suburbia but I found one and the bonus is that a house came with it.

I still have the S type Jaguar after nearly 36 years – it earned its place as a properly licensed wedding car along with two other similar cars (trading as Ballarat Classic Jags) for 20 years. Also, the red 1951 MM side valve convertible and of course the "Grey Morry". Also, along the way I acquired and restored the 1951 MM "Green Tourer" with a 1275 engine and a 1968 Morris Cooper S - Mark 1 1/2, called "The Cooper", this one started life as a NSW Police pursuit car.

And yes, I enjoy my Morries, but as my late Mother once said, "there is more to life than Morris Minors". and I replied "what".
